# RECTOR'S REPORT DR. PAUL F.M. ZAHL

Although my first Sunday as Rector was December 9th, Mary and I moved in to the Rectory in early January.

Bishop Salmon and Bishop Chane instituted me to "the living" on February 21st, 2008.

I am seeking to focus on that "aspect of love" (Andrew Lloyd Webber) which is Grace, which for me is the 'change agent' that love carries, if it



is to hit its mark; and on that theology of the cross by which God enters characteristically through the back door of our lives.

As the Vestry heard right from the start during the calling process, this means, so far as I believe, a complete cessation of hostilities in relation to church politics; a local vision which seeks to build up the All Saints parish family in vigor, love, and hope; and an emphasis on the Old, Old Story of Jesus and His Love. I hope that I will not deviate from these features of a ministry.

In the same relation that I would not be here without Mary, and her devoted support, Mary and I would not be here without Cabell Williams and David Stanley. Cabell helped us to see early on that we needed to take the initiatives from All Saints with heartfelt seriousness and prayerfulness. Plus, we warmed to Cabell instantly. David, whose father's inspiring ministry I had also known years ago, was the soul of patience, and persistence, as I 'processed' what we were hearing and seeing from All Saints.

Bishop Salmon, too, our old friend and most admired Episcopal figure, was key to our calling to come. Bishop Chane, as well, was affirming and actively helping, all along the line. Marcia Wilkinson and our dedicated staff -- and they are dedicated! -- welcomed us and supported us. Bruce Drury has become a big part of that support, too.

And all of you, each one of the members of All Saints, have helped us to feel welcome and, if I may put it this way, *wanted*. It is a big job, as we have come to see it, but I think, under God, that the job can be done.

Washington is pretty high-energy. Sometimes when I walk into that Sunday morning Rector's Forum, the electrical energy is palpable, surging and singing. (Did you ever see the 1941 movie "The Magnetic Monster", starring Lon Chaney, Jr.? I recommend it ... sort of.) Pray that we can, by God's Grace, *ground* some of that energy.

Thank you for electing me, for welcoming us, and for supporting us. We really need you!



# SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT CABELL WILLIAMS

The year 2007 was one of rebuilding for the All Saints community. We started the year bidding farewell to Fr. Al Zadig and his family as they moved to St. Michael's Church in Charleston, S.C.

Marcia Wilkinson was appointed Acting Rector and for five months she led our church with grace and aplomb. We're all very grateful to Marcia for serving our church at a time of great need.

With the departure of Fr. Zadig, the Vestry, in accordance with our bylaws, selected a committee to take on the task of finding and recommending a new Rector.



Those of you who have served previously on search committees know that this is a

difficult job that requires of each member a great deal of work and prayer. This was particularly true for our committee as they had to consider the recently issued 2005 Pastoral Statement which reflected the theological center of our parish as well as the need for healing and reconciliation within the All Saints community, the Diocese of Washington, TEC, and the Anglican Communion.

After careful review of some 70 applicants and four months of hard work, the search committee recommended, and the Vestry unanimously voted, to call The Reverend Dr. Paul Zahl to become the 9th rector of All Saints Church.

The committee believed Paul was ideally suited to lead All Saints Church. He is an orthodox priest whose beliefs and practices are centered in Christ and grounded in the Bible. His orthodoxy is not harsh -- but rather, centers on the grace of God as the only hope for the fallen man. His theological approach is open, loving and kind -- and conforms well with the Church's position outlined in the 2005 Pastoral Statement.

As of this writing, Paul has been with us for almost five months. I think I speak for the entire parish when I say that he is providing a much needed breath of fresh air for a parish that badly wants to come together again as a unified and Christ-centered church family. How blessed we are to have Paul and his lovely wife Mary here at All Saints!

In fact, in the midst of such troubled times in the Episcopal Church, I can't help but think of the Dr. Seuss book, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas." In the book, after all was lost, the Whos in Whoville sang with joy for the simple gift of living. Like the Whos, we at All Saints have much to be grateful for and many blessings for which to be thankful.

The vestry and our new rector already have started to lay the foundation for All Saints to grow. Marcia Wilkinson recently agreed to become All Saints head of pastoral care. It's a big job that encompasses all pastoral care issues at the church. Bruce Drury accepted the position of Parish Administrator and will take charge of the parish staff and all financial matters of the church. Nancy Harris was recently hired to be our in-house controller. She previously served in that position at St. Patrick's school in the District.

The Vestry has also approved the opening for a third priest who will work with young families. A formal search for that candidate has not begun, but several candidates have come forward and are under consideration.

George Cox and Bill Garner, co-chairs of the Parish preschool committee, recently made a recommendation that unanimously was accepted by the vestry to hire Karen Strimple, the former 20-year head of St. Columba's Church preschool, to take charge of our project to create a Parish school beginning in the fall of 2009.

There are many other people, far too many to mention, who are working hard to make a positive contribution towards the church community. Thus, I encourage you to read this entire annual report.

On a final note, we all owe a special thanks to our former Parish Administrator, John Hines, and our former Parish Nurse, Nancy Mullen, for their contribution to All Saints. Bishop Chane and Bishop Salmon also deserve our thanks for their wisdom and guidance during a very demanding and difficult time.

It is now up to us, the members of All Saints Church, to work together to move the church forward in a graceful and loving way that will attract more individuals and families to join us in receiving and celebrating the wonderful gift of faith in Jesus Christ.

# STEWARDSHIP REPORT -- THE JOY OF GIVING HARLEY WALSH, CHAIR

Stewardship is using the gifts God has given you and me – our time, our talent and our money – to do the work God calls us to do. Through the act of prayerful stewardship, one also experiences the joys of giving. This has been our central message during the 2007 stewardship campaign.

From a practical perspective, stewardship is the means by which we meet the needs of our parish and community with grateful and generous hearts. All Saints is a fully self-sustaining parish of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, so we depend on your time, talent and annual pledge to support All Saints ministries and day-to-day operations. Our ability to initiate and sustain our growing ministries depends completely on the personal and financial support of members and friends like you.

In addition to effectively communicating the overall stewardship message to parishioners, the main focus of the committee is annual pledges.

2008 has been a successful year in that regard, as we received \$1.15 million in pledges from almost 300 parishioners and families. This is a 10% increase over last year's total of \$1.05 million and came during a time of significant change in the parish with the arrival of our new rector. The median pledge also increased 10% from \$1,800 to \$2,000. We look forward to building on this success to enable the parish to continue its mission "To Know Christ and Make Him Known."

We give our heartfelt thanks indeed to each of you who has made your annual pledge or committed to a tithe for your faithful commitment.

We also extend our gratitude to the members of the Stewardship Committee, for their hard work of developing and carrying out ASC's annual stewardship initiatives -- like special mailings throughout the year.

The year 2007 ended with a \$74,000 increase in our operating cash reserves. Our operating income was \$1.446 million and expenses were \$1.360 million resulting in net ordinary income of \$86,000.

The expenses were less than anticipated primarily because of savings in clergy related expenses.

In terms of pledging -- our 2008 pledges as of April 24 total \$1,150,000, compared to \$1,109,000 for 2007, representing an increase of 12%. Your vestry anticipates substantial growth in our parish family during 2008, and they've passed a faith-based budget reflecting a deficit of \$244,000.

We have exciting new challenges for 2008 that will require additional funding ...

- 1) The planning for our own Christian based preschool is well underway.
- 2) We seek to call a third full-time clergy to better serve the youth and young adults of our church family.
- 3) As our numbers grow, we'll need additional support staff.
- 4) Our beautiful church needs constant care, and there are many capital improvements that have been deferred due to budget constraints.

How we will manage a deficit budget? We'll close the budget gap with your faithful support.

As of our latest tally, we have 297 pledges. The average pledge is \$3,870 -- but we need the average pledge to be at least \$5,000. Further, we need more of our parish family to pledge.

This is a unique moment in the life of this parish. We are experiencing substantial growth in membership and the parish energy is palpable. Thank you for your time and your devotion to All Saints Church!

#### **MUSIC MINISTRY**

We are dedicated to providing musical leadership for our worship of God and for the edification of his people. To this end, the Ministry of Music actively involves children, youth and adults. Singers, instrumentalists and hand bell ringers all play an active role.

Our goal is to know and serve the Lord Jesus Christ through the offering of music in the worship of His Church. To accomplish this, members of the Music Ministry meet faithfully every week throughout the year to carefully and lovingly prepare for our musical leadership in worship through the offering of hymns, psalms and spiritual songs.

Our mission is enhanced by special musical events and services throughout the season. Following is a recap of a few of these that occurred between 2007 and the present:

- † In May we were treated to an extraordinary concert by the bell choir from Christ Church, Savannah (Layne Hansen's church).
- + On June, we enjoyed the 1st annual Choir & Acolyte Awards & Recognition Banquet.
- + All Saints Sunday was celebrated on November 4 with a Choral Evensong and performance of Gabriel Fauré's *Requiem*.
- + Advent was ushered in with our annual Advent Festival of Lessons & Carols on December 2.
- + The Christmas services resounded with the beautiful musical offerings by the St. Nicholas Choir, the Treble Choir and the All Saints Choir, assisted by instrumentalists and hand bells.
- + An especially enjoyable social moment each year is the choir's annual "12<sup>th</sup> Night Party," this year celebrated on January 3 at the home of Judy & John Vandegriff.
- \* Several members of the All Saints Choir participated in a spectacular musical event at Washington National Cathedral February 2 celebrating the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Royal School of Church Music. We were joined by over 500 choristers from around the country. Wow!



- + Just a week later we marked the beginning of Lent with a Choral Evensong joining the choristers at Christ Church, Kensington.
- + On March 9, we traveled to Gaithersburg and performed Fauré's *Requiem* at Grace United Methodist Church.
- + Finally, we proclaimed the good news of Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday through the joyous singing of our choirs, augmented by bells, organ, brass and timpani. It has been a full and rewarding season indeed, and we are truly blessed.

Looking ahead briefly, there are three major initiatives coming into view for the Music Ministry.

- 1) First, we have a landmark concert here at All Saints on May 18 by the Resident Training Choir of the world renowned American Boy Choir.
- 2) Second, we're about to embark on the production of our second CD *Christmas at All Saints* which we are planning to release just in time for your Christmas shopping pleasure next December.
- 3) Third, the long overdue and anticipated restoration of our pipe organ will begin in June and be completed by September 15. Hallelujah!

#### **CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES**

What a wonderful year it's been! We've been blessed to see the children's programs continue to thrive and the seeds we've sown have not just put down strong roots -- the trees

are bearing wonderful fruit!

On the program side of this ministry, we had another booming year at Vacation Bible School, with just over 100 children participating in the summer of 2007. Our theme was "Take the Plunge: Make a Splash for Jesus," and the children did that, literally. The community has responded so positively that we are already "sold out" for



this year, with 150 children and over 50 volunteers. Our VBS outreach project last year was to collect items to donate to House by the Sea, a beach-side home that is used by families of critically-ill children. Other Outreach efforts continue to include cards made by the children to the homebound, and the Shoebox Christmas gifts and Easter baskets for Rosemount. We gather together as families in fellowship and fun during various parish activities like the Advent Festival, Christmas Pageant, Pancake Supper and more. In January, we began a Biblical Parenting Class in partnership with the Women of All Saints. And we continue to nurture the children through our Sunday Children's Chapel and First Communion classes.

Our two Godly Play classrooms, opened last fall, have been a wonderful way for our children to learn the stories of their faith and to learn the language that helps them talk about it. We will open four more classrooms in the fall of 2008, with a specialized room for the fifth grade class appropriate to their developmental level. All Saints will be a showcase for this curriculum and our teachers have devoted much time and love into nurturing this program. We look forward to partnering with the Godly Play Foundation to bring this teaching to as many children as we can, not just in the DC area, but throughout the world.



We continue to hold teacher training throughout the year and provide weekly teacher emails for continuing support and encouragement.

I would like to thank the Vestry for their generous support of the Children's Ministries, allocating \$16,000 this year. The Children's Faith Formation Committee has done an outstanding job of helping to guide our programs throughout this past year, and to uplift me and the ministry in prayer. We welcomed Heather Langille and Ashley Sharp to our fine team of Ashley Johnston, Lyn Witt, Sally Sagarese and Lindsay Walsh, who have now served for 2 years.



The children are a continual delight for me, and for the Sunday School teachers. Each Sunday, as the children and I walk up the center aisle to Children's Chapel, I can't help but think to myself how blessed we are to be in the midst of such joy and to watch them grow to become a part of the family that numbers as many stars as there are in the sky and as many grains of sand as there are in the desert.

This major effort included raising \$1,000 from our Bake Sale and Poinsettia Sale to buy Christmas gifts ... collecting donations from many parishioners (thank you!) and our thrift shop ... then sorting, packing and shipping over 500 lbs. of clothing (including winter coats, boots, hats), blankets, housewares, games, books and toys.
- **†** Our best-ever Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper attended by over 100 parishioners of all ages. Working together, Middle & High School students, along with several parent volunteers raised \$1,300+ to benefit summer missions trips. We're especially grateful to our dedicated event chairs, Tom & Leslie Carr for all of their hard work, generous contributions and support!

This productive first half of the school year was followed by our hiring of Hawley Morrison as Acting Youth Minister in January. Please join us in keeping Hawley, all of our youth leaders, our middle and high school students and this important ministry in your daily prayers!

## HIGH SCHOOL REPORT REBECCA DRURY, YOUTH LEADER

This year the Lord has shown us that All Saints Youth Ministry is truly *His* ministry. Over the course of the year, we've maintained our regular Sunday evening gatherings (see Middle School Report), as well as our Wednesday night Bible Study.   - -- Highlights of Vestry minutes were added as a regular feature in March 2008
  - -- The newsletter is also available on the website
  - -- Submissions are due mid-month, about 10-14 days prior to distribution
- **†** New Visitors Welcome Packet -- we developed a comprehensive "brochure" that provides a complete overview of all church ministries and activities, presented in a polished, reader/user-friendly format. Thanks to Susan Grayson for help with assembling!
- + New Weekly Email Format -- we started using a new format for our weekly email newsletter under the Constant Contact program in February, 2008, which works via the internet and offers several helpful marketing features.

GO seeks to encourage a globally-oriented vision for evangelism among the members of the ASC family.



#### **2007 ACTIVITIES**

1) Developing ongoing relationship, prayer, and <u>regular financial support</u> for various global missions organizations.

In 2007 the vestry gave us a budget of \$33,000 for which we are very grateful! However, we had income close to \$55,000 in 2007 because of additional designated gifts to our mission partners from members of All Saints. In 2007, we disbursed about \$54,000 to mission agencies and missionaries. (a financial summary follows the Local Outreach report)

2) Collaborative support of local outreach projects:

GO cooperates with All Saints local outreach team to augment local outreach ministries through the Christmas Giving Tree, Outreach Sundays, the Annual Mission Week, providing meals for the Montgomery Shelter, etc. This past year (2007), GO organized the Christmas Giving Tree, which netted \$6,869 in cash gifts for global outreach partners (as well as gifts in kind for local partners). These funds were disbursed in January 2008.

3) Organization of the <u>2ndAnnual ASC Missions Week</u> and the "Word for the World" Mission Conference (February 4–11, 2007) GO hosted a week of local and global missions emphasis with inspiring nationally- and internationally-known speakers.

#### 4) Outreach Sunday

Beginning February 4, 2007, GO initiated "Outreach Sunday," to be held the first Sunday of each month.

5) Rwandan Coffee Ministry

Beginning February 4, 2007, GO initiated the Rwandan coffee ministry to sell high quality, fair price Rwandan coffee as a means to spread the gospel and foster reconciliation in Rwanda. This project is a ministry of our global outreach partner, Bp. John Rucyahana.

#### **LOCAL OUTREACH MINISTRY**

Seeking to minister to our nearby neighbors in Washington and Maryland, All Saints Local Outreach is motivated by Jesus' words:



"Whatever you did for one of the least of these ... you did it for me" (Matthew 25:40, NIV).

<u>In 2007-2008, LO continued to support our 3 principal partners</u> through service and financially with gifts of \$6,000 each:

- 1) <u>Community Council for the Homeless</u> -- Rebuilds and sustains lives in northwest DC, by providing food, transitional/permanent housing, mental health counseling and medical referrals. Co-Chair Anna Tyng has long led ASC in funding and helping out at Friendship Place, where Barbara de Franceaux also volunteers, and at the Haven, Zeke House and Veronica House shelters.
- 2) <u>Christ House</u> -- Offers temporary residence and medical care for the poor/homeless. Coordinated by Tuttie Webster, ASC members provide/serve meals every 4<sup>th</sup> Monday.
- 3) <u>Central Union Mission</u> -- Transforms lives and develops disciples while serving hungry, homeless, hurting adults and children in DC, by teaching God's Word and providing food, shelter, comfort, and Christian counseling. ASC parishioners donated school supplies in the fall, and gifts/toys at Christmas, collected and delivered by Richard Hacker, Nina George Hacker, and Dick Potter.

#### **Local Outreach also donated money, gifts and service to:**

<u>Martha's Table</u> -- Mark & Diana Pape coordinated the delivery of dozens of cooked turkeys, hams, and pies from All Saints to feed the hungry at Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter. Second Saturdays, ASC volunteers prepare lunches at MT.

Rockville's Community Based Shelter -- In 2007, seven different groups from ASC provided an entire week's meals for 30 residents, May 13-19, led by Dorothy Welsh, Dick Potter, Jean Bruder, John & Beth Cartland, Frank Gallo, Joy Starnes, Donna Payne, and Bill & Alice Anne Freund. In 2008, Julie Weihe will coordinate our June 15-21 week.

<u>Spring Road Family Apartments</u> -- In partnership with All Saints Thrift Shop, Dick Potter delivers toys and personal toiletries to this emergency residence for homeless families in DC on approximately a monthly basis.

<u>Rebuilding Together</u> -- In April 2008, ASC volunteers led by Harry Ferris and Mark Pape, in partnership with John Vandegriff and the Friendship Heights Rotarians, provided skilled and unskilled labor to revitalize the McGibbon home on Third St. NW.

<u>Fannie Mae's Annual Walkathon for the Homeless</u> -- Raises awareness and funds to help prevent / end homelessness. An ASC group took part in this 5K walk, and Susan Wright and Lyn Witt led the ASC children in a mini-Walkathon around the church.

<u>Episcopal Center for Children</u> -- Sue Stanley, Noel Bradley and Dick Potter delivered dozens of parishioner-baked cookies for the children and staff during Feb. cookie month.

#### FLOWER GUILD

The Flower Guild is inspired by the motto "Flowers for the Glory of God" which keeps us aware of our mission to beautify His House of worship and use the natural beauty of flowers that He has given us to bring joy to others.

The Flower Guild consists of 27 members and comprises 3 regular teams of 6-7 members each, plus a fourth group of those who can't participate regularly, but enjoy decorating for holidays and special occasions. The 3 regular teams rotate 2-week assignments throughout the year, dur-

ing which they arrange flowers on the High Altar, St. Mary's Altar and elsewhere around the church prior to Sunday services. For Christmas and Easter, all teams, as well as the special holiday group, share the work and joy of making the church a place of great beauty. Practical aspects include selecting flowers at the wholesale warehouse, preparing "mechanics" such as floral foam to hold the arrangements, tending the arrangements once in place, and "recycling" used but still fresh flowers into smaller bouquets for hospitalized and homebound parishioners.

The Flower Guild works closely with the Altar Guild, as both are involved in maintaining and enhancing the beauty of our worship space. Like the Altar Guild, the work of the Flower Guild is tied to the seasonal liturgy of the Church (which provides a great opportunity for newcomers to learn about this aspect of our worship). The flowers and foliage used on the altars are consistent with the liturgical colors and meaning of each season – for example, in the reflective seasons of Advent and Lent, only foliage is used, whereas at festival times such as Easter and Pentecost gorgeous flowers (white and red respectively) are very much in evidence! During Advent, the Flower Guild conducts a workshop for all interested parishioners, where they create small Advent wreaths for home use.

In addition to regular Sunday and seasonal decorating, the Flower Guild undertakes special projects for festive occasions. This year it was our great joy to beautify the church in mid-Lent for the Institution of Dr. Zahl.

New members are always welcome – no special training is required, one learns by doing, and the more experienced team members are always happy to provide advice and help.


